
Revision: See the folder titled "Help with Revision" Students should not attempt all exercises, but select activities where they feel they most need practice.

Maths:

You have a log in code for the <u>https://app.myimaths.com</u> website. Complete the tasks assigned which are based on recent, current work and revision. Your individual maths teacher will set homework on this site. Additionally, you could go back over past tasks and also revise using 1-2 of the materials suggested in the Year group weekly info sheet.

Writing – Research an appropriate News Article from around the world or your home country Identify and write short notes about the information from within the article which answers the following questions:

Who?

What?

When?

Where?

Why/How?

If you are up to a challenge – look for the same article from a different newspaper source and combine the information.

Once you have gathered this information, pretend you are a reporter and write the news article using the format below in your own words. Make sure you separate your details into paragraphs. An example is given in a separate document with this e-mail. Use this to help you.

A typical newspaper article contains five (5) parts: **Headline:** This is a short, attention-getting statement about the event. **Byline:** This tells who wrote the story.

Lead paragraph:

This has ALL of the who, what, when, where, why and how in it. A writer must find the answers to these questions and write them into the opening sentence(s) of the article.

Explanation:

After the lead paragraph has been written, the writer must decide what other facts or details the reader might want to know. The writer must make sure that he/she has enough information to answer any important questions a reader might have after reading the headline and the lead paragraph. This section can also include direct quotes from witnesses or bystanders.

Additional

Information:

This information is the least important. Thus, if the news article is too long for the space it needs to fill, it can be shortened without rewriting any other part. This part can include information about a similar event.

ICT: To assist with your learning in scratch, open your Code account from Term 1 and work for a minimum of 45 minutes – more if you like. (Ask your teacher for your log in code if you can't remember it) Try to push yourself to learn new skills as you work through the activities.
