Year 1

This week we have started our new English unit on the Little Red Hen. The children have loved learning a new story and the actions that go with it.

Year 2

Year 2 has been learning how to solve division word problems by dividing groups into 2 or 5. They have been drawing, making or using their multiplication facts knowledge to find the solution.

Nayel had 25 sweets to share with himself and his friends. He shared them with 4 friends. How many sweets would they each get?

Year 3

The last two weeks had

been a very busy two weeks in year 3. On the 13th February we had our sports day in the afternoon. The students had great fun doing activities that involved jumping, throwing and running. It was fantastic to see all the parents come and support their children! On the 18th February, after doing a few weeks on Money in Maths, the upstairs class teachers decided to have a 'shop'. The students were put into pairs - one had to be the 'buyer', the other the 'shopkeeper'. The 'buyer' bought a few items and the 'shopkeeper' had to work out the amount of change they had to give back to the 'buyer'. A great time was had by all. Finally, the school celebrated International Day on the 19th February. In year 3, the students learnt about the 'Big Five' animals in South Africa, they learnt to do the haka from New Zealand, they danced around a maypole just as the English did years ago, they made daffodils which is the Welsh national flower and learnt about places around the world. The students also brought in food from their countries and the spread was wonderful! Thank you to all the parents for contributing.

Year 4

Maths: We have now completed our unit on multiplication and division. The next few weeks will be filled with fractions, decimals and money. We are now learning about equivalent fractions and methods for finding them. This unit of work incorporates all we have learnt already in year 4 and can be at times fun and challenging.

English

Reading: Home readers are being sent home. We encourage thought provoking discussions at home on the stories read. Keep it up!
Writing: We have completed our explanation texts and are now moving onto biography writing, looking at famous/influential inventers.

Integrated Curriculum

This coming week we will having an Innovation Day. The students will be partaking in an 'Egg Drop Challenge.' It's going to be exciting to build and design products fit for purpose. The students will be able to plan, design and cooperatively build an object/product able to safely land an egg from a designated height.



Science

We are starting our new unit with electricity.
Looking at circuits, problem solving, insulators and conductors, safety measures and inventions which led to more inventions.



Year 5 Maths

We visually compared and ordered fractions with different denominators using the bar model and laminated grids to allow us to identify the fractions with the lowest common multiple.



Integrated curriculum

Pupils explored the behaviour of tectonic plates with dry and soggy biscuits in order to ascertain what may happen when two tectonic plates collide.

Science

We changed one of the variables in our parachute in order to slow it down. Also, we tested different materials at Green Mubazzarah in order to design a camel sledge that would be efficient and would offer less resistance and friction. To achieve this, pupils used Newton meters, which they attached to the materials. They then added some weight to the sledge to check how efficient the material would be.



We also celebrated International day right before the break.





Year 6

Our Science topic this term is Healthy Bodies and as part of that, we have been learning about healthy food and the different food groups. We linked our Art topic to this and studied the pieces created by the Italian artist, Giuseppe Arcimboldo. He used a variety of fruits and vegetables to create portraits, creating amazingly creative pictures. We discussed how we could recreate this with our own portraits and considered which fruits and vegetables would be best to create specific features, e.g. .glasses, ears and braces. To create our own portraits, we traced over photos of our faces, then chose which foods to use to represent each part. After cutting out the pictures, we completed our faces in layers, starting with our necks and skin, then our clothing, hair and finally facial features. Our portraits came out surprising realistic and was great fun to make!


