FS1

Earth day learning about how to look after our planet. We walked around the school and picked up any litter we saw. We then made hats to wear out so we can tell people not to litter and to keep the UAE tidy. FS 1 Red class were learning all about looking after the Earth today. We put on our gloves and picked up all the rubbish around the school, we then put it all in the bin. In **FS1 Yellow** we are learning to recognise numbers and count quantities.



FS2

FS2 have hit the ground running in their learning in Term 3. Spelling lists have started and the words are linked to the phonemes which are being learnt.

The new topic for the start of this term is 'Traditional Tales', which has begun with a focus on the story of Jack and the Beanstalk. We have been re-enacting the story with masks and props, and using a range of materials to build our own beanstalks.

In literacy we have been imagining ourselves as the character of Jack and writing an apology letter to the Giant, to say that we are sorry for stealing the golden egg-laying hen. This is linked to our phonics work as we are focussing on independent spellings in writing. In literacy we have also started to look at adjectives to describe the different characters of the story based on their looks and personality traits. This has been great for the imagination in thinking about different describing words.







Year 1

This week Year 1 got some exciting news that some interesting bones had been found in our playground.



Year 1 decided to investigate for themselves and found some bones of their own. The children examined the bones closely and discussed what creatures the bones may be from. They had lots of fantastic ideas.





Year 2

Welcome to the summer term from Year 2. We have had a busy start back to the term and have begun to look at our next topic. We are learning about a significant event in British history which is the Great Fire of London. It happened a very long time ago in 1666. The children have been investigating different sources to try to find out what happened and why the event was so important in history.

In maths, we are looking at units of measure, and 2B have been comparing their differing heights within their class. We wonder how much they have grown this year.



Year 3

Another cross-curricular week of learning in Year 3! In this week's pictures you will see that we have begun our new topic (3 Million Years Ago) in Integrated Curriculum. We have been trying to imagine life in Stone Age times by reading, discussing videos, ordering events on a timeline and creating our own cave paintings. In the coming weeks we will look at the specific work of archaeologists as they attempt to piece together the evidence from the past to discover aspects of early life. We are all very excited!!



In English, we have begun reading the book 'Seasons of the Sandstorm' by Mary Pope Osborne. Within the first two weeks of term the children have been engaged in studying the novel in depth, writing creatively to predict the story and learning a wealth of new vocabulary. It has been yet another action-packed fortnight full of wonderful learning in Year 3!

Year 4 Maths

We have now moved onto shape and measurement.
We have and will be looking at the properties of 2D and 3D shapes, measuring and converting length/weight, calculating perimeter and area as well as types of angles.

English

Spelling Bee: We have named our finalists for the next spelling bee which will be taking place on Wednesday the 1st of May 2019. Well done to all those who studied, but unfortunately didn't make it through. Good luck to the finalists from each class!

Reading: Please make sure you bring your home readers to school and don't forget to change your book once you have read it.



Writing: We are now moving onto aspects of 'Talk for Writing.' This is a way to learn new vocabulary, build confidence when saying more complex sentences and gives the students opportunities to innovate their writing. Below are some pictures of 4B doing their talk for writing.



Integrated Curriculum

States of Matter: We have learnt about the different states of matter and how various objects can change between these states either through chemical reactions or temperature changes.



Year 5 Writing

We have been learning about adventure stories. We have recapitulated on all the features of adventure stories with suspense. Pupils have carried out a writing hot task creating their own atmosphere by including all features on the writing toolkit.

Maths

We have worked on interpreting and representing line graphs, two way tables and timetables.

Integrated curriculum

We have started our new topic "Mission to Mars" and we received a visit from an external agency which built up a cosmic dome in the hall. Pupils loved the experience and it was a great way to kick off our new topic of space.

They have also made WANTED posters using art techniques to make the poster look old and worn.




