

Welcome back for the final weeks of school! It has been an epic journey throughout the year with lots and lots of fond memories.

In the final weeks we will be learning the final topics in the curriculum: the triagraph phonemes /air/, /ure/ and /ear/, and in maths we will learn about doubling numbers and about money.



Our final topic for the school year is 'Dinosaurs'. We will be learning a new story about dinosaurs which will be supported by a range of activities such as describing dinosaurs, making dinosaurs out of a variety of materials, and doing observational drawings and paintings.

We are all super excited for the FS2 Graduation on June 20th. We are all very busy learning the songs and practising. The graduation ceremony will begin at 12:00pm in the school hall. Parents and families are encouraged to arrive promptly as seating will be limited for the celebration. A letter with the final details will be sent home by June 13th.

Year 1

Before the Eid break, Year 1 were lucky enough to have some special visitors to their classes. The Year 3 children came down to our classes to show us the wonderful games they had been making.



Year 3 used magnets as part of their game and came up with some very inventive board games for us to try out.



We loved trying out the different games and learning new rules.



Year 1 were amazed by how creative the games were and how professional they looked.

Year 2

Great Balls of Fire!

Year 2 really enjoyed learning about the "Great Fire of London' last half term and did lots of writing, researching and art work.



The final piece was a newspaper report and then making an actual newspaper. The children made the paper look old by scrunching it up and then smoothing the paper over with wet tea bags.



When the paper had dried an adult then burnt it to give it a 1666 feel! Here are 2B's work on display. The children wrote their own headlines and chose the names of their papers.



Year 3

During the last week of Ramadan, we started two new units. Lights and Shadows in Science and Artists around the World in Integrated Curriculum.

For the Integrated Curriculum unit, we discussed various colours on the colour wheel, what a primary colour is and which primary colours would we mix together to make secondary colours. We then painted our own colour wheels. Next, we looked at shading and tinting and the different ways artists used these methods to paint. We looked at the artists Vincent Van Gogh's work and tried painting in his style, using the shading and tinting method. The picture the students are painting is 'Starry night'.



For science, we have been looking at various light sources, which are natural and man-made light sources. We then looked at shadows and answered the questions: How are shadows formed? and How do shadows change? The students had great fun doing hand shadows on the walls in the classrooms! They also made objects that was then put in front of a light to see what shadow was created.

Year 4 Maths

All of our students have been doing a fantastic job preparing themselves for our upcoming maths assessment. We have been working on areas that need to be revisited and because of this the students are becoming more self-confident in their own ability.

English

We have moved from imitating the newspaper report to innovating the text with our own ideas; one example of this is when we created our own news headlines. Below is an image of our efforts:



Integrated Curriculum

We are comparing schools from the Victorian Age to schools nowadays and having a look at the style of learning, class environment, the ways students were punished and the slang used. Below is a picture of Adam in 4A doing a great job demonstrating what is was like to be punished by wearing the dunce hat.



Year 5

Writing

We have started our new topic on non-chronological reports and pupils have designed a fact file about a made up country (Aragon).



We will continue to talk the text and carry out different activities to learn the structure and features of information texts.



Maths

We are now finishing our unit on measure. We worked on area of simple and composite shapes. Also, we learnt how to work out the perimeter of simple and composite shapes and the volume of different regular shapes. Pupils also learnt how to estimate the area of irregular shapes.



Integrated Curriculum and Science

We have learnt about the different phases of the moon and how this relates to it orbiting the Earth and its position regarding the Earth and the Sun. We finally launched our rockets in the field. This was a very pleasurable experience, which pupils enjoyed very much.








Year 6

After Our Formula One Bonanza, Year 6 have pushed on to learn about modern scientists and inventors. We have studied the life and work of Stephen Hawking over the last 2 weeks. An example of using resilience to fight adversity, Hawking overcame the physical limitations of ALS, a debilitating disease, to give the world amazing new theories and knowledge about the universe. He is best known for creating new knowledge and understanding about black holes.

In art, we have been studying the work of Piet Mondrian, a 20th Century Dutch painter who influenced the abstract and minimalist movements by reducing images to blocks of colour and straight lines.



Over the next 2 weeks, our Year 6s will begin their formal transition period to Year 7. Next week our AAESS prefects will be doing a range of orientation and teamwork exercises with our students. This is followed by the Year 7 information evening on the 19th June, culminating with Year 6 classes spending lessons in Secondary School from 23rd - 26th June.




READING 4 PLEASURE
