Year 1

Year 2

It has been a very busy week this week in Year 2!

This week we finally got to write our own diary entry about Humph's travels around the UAE! We were so excited to get started that we didn't want to stop.



In maths we have been learning about the column method and how to use this to add 2-digit numbers together. We will eventually move on to using this in subtraction!



In science, we have been learning all about habitats and how animals adapt to their own habitats. Did you know a polar bear's fur is transparent not white?



Year 3

Over the last few weeks, we were fortunate enough to go to the Geological museum at the UAE University. The children had a fantastic time and some were even lucky enough to take a fossil or a rock home.



In Maths we have moved onto dividing and multiplying 2 digit numbers by 1 digit. The children have been using arrays and manipulatives to help them solve challenging problems.



In English, we have been focusing on imitating the text 'The Egyptian Cinderella' while writing our very own stories based around the book.



Year 4

This week:

Maths: We have started Multiplication and Division and are busy learning all the different methods we can use to solve those tricky problems!



English: We have been focussing on diary writing. We started by looking at all the different features we need to include to make our diaries the best they can be. This week we have been working on our own diaries. We are very excited to be writing a diary from the point of view of His Highness Sheikh Zayed.

Integrated Curriculum: We are now looking at Al Ain Defenders and are focussing on conservation of our environment including the animals that live there. Each class has an endangered animal that they are learning about.

In other news:

Following on from our bridge building day, we had a competition to see which bridge would be the ultimate champion in Year 4! We went to the new auditorium and Mr Sacks ran the proceedings.



We have also been busy in PE as you can see from the pictures!

Year 5 Writing

Pupils have learnt about fronted adverbials, powerful verbs and using commas to demarcate clauses. In addition, we have started the innovating process with the myths they were familiar with and they have replaced the setting, main characters and some main events with their own ones.



Maths

We have carried out an elicitation task on multiplication and division. We have focused our mathematical learning on multiplication tables done practically with manipulatives, multiples, factors, squared numbers, cubed numbers and prime numbers.



Integrated curriculum

We have created a Roman soldier with plastic bottles, newspapers, cardboard and mod rock. We have explored the Roman way of life through nonwritten sources. We have also examined different sources of evidence to learn about the past through the Roman soldier attire and its purpose.

Year 6

It has been a busy couple of weeks for year 6. We visited Al Ain Zoo recently to support our learning of classification of local animals as well as learn about the geological and cultural history of the UAE at the Sheikh Zayed Desert Learning Centre.



We have continued our learning around persuasive leaflet texts. We have written our own scripts on attracting the reader to different theme parks in the UAE, by using the same techniques we learnt from the Wadi Adventure model text.



In maths we have had fun exploring the properties of factors, multiples primes and square numbers, including how to reduce any composite number to the product of its prime factors.

In integrated curriculum we have continued our study of Europe and have learnt about the timeline of the European Union and how it was set up to allow greater cooperation between nations.




READING 4 PLEASURE

Shadow the Sheepdog - Enid Blyton

At a very young age I loved reading. My first encounter with books by Enid Blyton was at the age of 7. I had saved my pocket money with the idea of buying a book. I went into a bookshop with my mother one Saturday morning and bought my very first book, Shadow the Sheepdog, by Enid Blyton. I still have this book on my bookshelf to this day and it is very special to me because every time I look through it, even now, I remember the great excitement of going to that bookshop and not being able to wait to get home to read the wonderful adventures of Shadow. I also love looking at the illustrations at the beginning of each chapter.

For many years after, I read every book by this author, that I could lay my hands on, until I had finished all of them, including the Famous Five and Secret Seven series. I actively encourage children to read her books as they have great appeal and, best of all, they develop vocabulary in a very subtle way as young readers are able to work out what the unfamiliar words are on their own, enabling them to read with both understanding and enjoyment without needing support.

It makes me very happy to see so many of my students 'hooked' on Enid.
